MESSAGE from the Rabbi

Every year I love watching the State of The Union Address given by the President of the United States. I love the traditions and even the pageantry. I love to see both Houses and the Judiciary together. I love listening to important ideas and policies. I even appreciate hearing ideas that do not align with my own values, presented with care, as they usually make me stretch my mind to try to understand the positions of those with differing views. I think I also love the speech because people dress up, guests are invited, there are traditions, a counter narrative, and even after-parties. I care for our Country so I love when we take stock. In some ways it reminds me of our own Jewish High Holy Days. In just a few weeks we will come together to allow ourselves to take stock of our souls, to strive to be better Jews and people, to endeavor to be a better community, to celebrate as a community, and to start the year anew and with renewed vigor to become our best selves and our best community.

In 1966 our teacher, Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel^{x¹}, wrote about what we should look for when we enter a synagogue for prayer; his words continue to inspire us as we prepare to enter a New Year. He asks, "What then is the purpose of going to the synagogue?" His answers help us to consider why we might want to come to synagogue services. He reminds us that the point of a religious service is to find "insights of the spirit" and to work on the state of our neshamot, our souls.

"Many are the facilities which help us to acquire the important worldly virtues, skills and techniques. But where should one learn about the insights of the spirit? Many are the opportunities for public speech; where are the occasions for inner silence? It is easy to find people who will teach us how to be eloquent; but who will teach us how to be still? It is sure important to develop a sense of humor; but is it not also important to develop a sense of reverence? Where should one learn the eternal wisdom of compassion? The fear of being cruel? The danger of being callous? Where should one learn that the greatest truth is found in contrition? Important and precious as the development of our intellectual faculties are, the cultivation of a sensitive conscience is indispensable." (A.J. Heschel)

It is my hope that each of us will find opportunities over the High Holy Days at TJC to cultivate our spirits. With this as a goal I invite you to think about services as a time to reconnect with Our People, our community, your neshama, and of course, first, with The Holy One of Blessing. I hope that throughout the many services that we engage in you find time to sit with the words and ideas of the *Machzor*, the High Holy Day Prayer book, and just contemplate. Though I may announce page numbers and encourage you to chant or sing with us, I also want to encourage you to use the time in shul to concentrate on one page, line or idea from the words of our sacred Tradition to see how your soul might be moved or changed. You do not need to "say every word" or to "finish" any one given prayer; instead please feel open to using the time and our ancient words to take stock of the "State of Your Soul."

I invite you to be open to new experiences and tunes. Avi and I are working to bring you services with your old favorite tunes, and with ones that are new, and can open our hearts to joy or to contemplation, or both. As "shlichai tzibor," or "emissaries of the prayer community" we are also part of the community, and it is our High Holy Days as well. As such, our souls could use your help: If you are moved to sing/chant along with us, please do, with gusto. We promise that it will be a gift to you and the entire community to have a larger sound in our prayer space. Last year, one of our youngest members, at age 5, was moved to dance

during one of the prayers. Every person who witnessed this, including Avi and myself, were transported to a higher spiritual place because we witnessed the authentic spiritual actions of this young person. So if the spirit of a prayer moves you to dance, *L'Chaim*, please do so. And if you need a break from our services try one of our other spaces for quiet contemplation, or take a walk on our beautiful grounds, catch up with a shul friend. That too is the work of our High Holidays.

Last year on Yom Kippur we debuted a new way to sing the part of the service where we recount the actions of the ancient High Priest on Yom Kippur. We hope that you will stay for the Musaf, the additional part of the Yom Kippur service into the early afternoon and beyond. We hope you will return for Mincha and for the end of our Neihlah service, where each person is invited to come to the bima alone or with family to say a prayer in front of the Aron Kodesh (Ark of the Torahs). We will end the day with a beautiful Havdalah service together. Anyone with a shofar is invited to sound the shofar at the end of the service. All children will be given light sticks.

In addition to our traditional Congregational service please consider joining me for Two Alternative Spiritual Experiences. On the first day of Rosh Hashana, Saturday at 4:00 to 5:15 p.m. in the Tent, I will be accompanied by musician Sally Mitlas and others for a time of song, study, joy, contemplation, music and more. On Yom Kippur afternoon we will have an alternative Yizkor service where we will share our losses and the love that we have for those who touched our lives. Both of these options are open to anyone.

Also, let's remember that the holidays can be hard for those without family/friends nearby. If you are able to host someone/a family for a holiday meal, or you would like to be hosted, please reach out to Cynthia at crichman@thejewishcenter.org asap. Also, please consider family and friends who are not yet affiliated with a shul and invite them to join our community.

A note about TJC staff and clergy: our dedicated staff and an army of volunteers will be working hard throughout the holiday season to create a warm, welcoming, spiritual and safe atmosphere where we can start the year off right. Many members in the community give of their time and expertise so that we can all start the year together and well. Please remember to give all the benefit of the doubt if something is not how you wish it to be.

We hope that this holiday season will be one where we joyously celebrate as a community, one of inner silence and soaring soulful sounds, one where we elevate the ideas of compassion and contrition for ourselves and for others. And then, onward to the holiday of Sukkot, a time to dwell outside in our Sukkah. Like last year, all are invited to a light breakfast in my own Sukkah on the first two days of the holiday at 9:00 a.m. before the service. I hope to see you there!

Weaving is the practice of connecting fabrics to make a complete garment. In Judaism, many ritual objects weave distinct strands together to link them, to create a stronger whole. The three strands of a challah, the multiple wicks of a braided Havdalah candle used to end Shabbat, and the knotted tzitzit at the corners of a tallit are woven together to convey that we are stronger together, with the parts inextricably woven into the design.

Just as these ritual objects weave different objects together, our congregation is comprised of different people with remarkable attributes. The more we learn about each other and get to know each other, the more friends we will have and the more our congregation will be woven together.

Friends.

Time boggles my mind. As I write this, I am sitting outside, the sun is shining, and there is not a cloud in the sky. My kids are in the pool with their friends, and the din of voices and music through the pool speaker serves as the perfect background noise for a perfect summer day.

But as you read this, the leaves are changing color, the school has started, we are in the throes of the Holy Day season, and the world has turned into pumpkin spice everything. Somehow, so much changes, and yet so much stays the same.

As with every summer, this summer I made the time to go watch the sunrise on the beach.

As of this writing, I've only gone twice, and while each sunrise was remarkably similar, they were both so different. So much can change in the course of a day, an hour, a minute, and somehow the sun continues to rise and set as though nothing changed. Something HAS changed, however. We have changed. In one day, we see things a little differently, notice something we hadn't previously noticed, or seek out a new experience. The first sunrise I was watching, mesmerized as the first glimmer of light broke over the shimmering ocean. The second sunrise, I tried to find where the moon had gone and felt a sense of loss that I didn't see it fade away.

The Torah is the same way. Every time we read it, the words are the same. Bereishit barah Elohim et ha shamayim v'et ha aretz. In the beginning, the Creator created the heavens and the earth. And every year, somehow, I hear something different. One year, I heard about how something materialized from nothing. The next year, I pondered the word Bereishit and found the words create and head, and wonder what it means to create something in one's head. Perhaps that is why Rabbi Ben Bag Bag said we should "turn it and turn it for everything is in it." Keep this in mind, as Simchat Torah is upon us, and we will restart the Torah reading cycle.

I invite you to look at something familiar and find something different. Is it an aspect of nature? Is it the Torah? Is it another text? To me, life is about turning and turning and turning again. You might be surprised at what you find.


Two important symbols of Sukkot are the lulav and etrog. We recite the blessing over them each day of the holiday as an expression of gratitude for God's bounty, and we carry them in procession around the synagogue during each morning service. Rabbi Merow strongly encourages members of the congregation to purchase their own lulav and etrog set to be displayed in their sukkah or at home and to be brought to the synagogue to participate in the processions (hakafot). While they last for only a short time, their presence is felt beyond the festival. We hope that many of you will continue to participate in this tradition. 
HEAR THE SOUND OF THE SHOFARI

Muslim-Jewish Sisterhood





LIFE & LEGACY | Jou!

Our community recently lost a very special member. Ruth Schreiber Fath passed away on May 12, 2023. Many of us will long remember seeing Ruth at Shabbat services, sitting with her devoted and compassionate caregiver, Shirley. With her inextinguishable smile, Ruth warmly greeted every congregant who stopped by her wheelchair to say hello.

Ruth's journey was one of intellectual pursuits, cultural exploration, and a deep-rooted connection to Judaism, which culminated in her generous bequest of \$100,000 to the Life & Legacy Endowment Fund. This magnanimous donation is a testament of Ruth's devotion to The Jewish Center and her desire to ensure its continued flourishing.

With deep appreciation for a life richly lived and a remarkable individual, we'd like to tell you a bit of her story.

Born November 10, 1937, Ruth grew up in an orthodox home in Rochester, N.Y. She earned an undergraduate degree through a joint program with Columbia University and The Jewish

Theological Seminary. As a college student, she lived in Israel for a year studying Hebrew language and literature and spent several months on Kibbutz Tirat Zvi.

When she returned to the U.S., Ruth enrolled in graduate studies at Hunter College which led to an MSW degree. Later, Ruth shifted her focus, delved into the realm of psychology and earned a degree from the New York Freudian Society. With her intellectual insight and compassionate nature, Ruth built a thriving practice as a psychoanalyst in Manhattan in the 1970s.


Ruth's niece, Ronda Schreiber has fond memories of visiting her aunt, "a

hip, independent young woman living an interesting life in Manhattan." Ruth made many life choices that were rather unconventional at that time, especially as the daughter of traditional parents. All those choices made Ruth a beloved aunt, and later, after marrying Joe, the beloved stepmother of Joe's four adult children, Dan, Jon, Rebecca and Deborah.

With Joe, Ruth loved traveling across Europe, Israel and South Africa and welcoming extended family and friends to celebrations in their homes in Princeton and Nantucket.

After moving to Princeton in 1985, Ruth continued to work as a psychoanalyst, along with serving as chairperson of the Commission for the New Jersey Children's Trust Fund, a fund dedicated to preventing child abuse and neglect.

In addition to all the contributions Ruth made to family, friends and the community, Ruth played an important role



Ruth heard my mother speak that night, and she approached me and said "Evy, I think there is someone in Princeton who is related to the Cassirers." I was a bit incredulous and skeptical, but indeed Ruth was right. She had the amazing insight to connect Eva to Peter Paret, a professor at the Institute of Advanced Studies. His mother, Suzanne Cassirer was Eva's cousin. Peter grew up knowing the story of how Eva saved a Jewish girl during the Holocaust, but he never knew her name, or what happened to her after the war. It was Ruth who listened to my mother's words and made that remarkable connection. Along with all that Ruth has given to the Princeton Jewish community, this was a special gift to me.

It will be difficult to walk into Rosh Hashanah services this year without glancing at the seats where Ruth and Shirley always sat. Ruth will be remembered and missed. Her

generous legacy gift to the synagogue underscores the value she placed on supporting and sustaining The Jewish Center. May her memory be a blessing to us all.




