MESSAGE from the Rabbi

Friends-

I write this note weeks before this newsletter will come out so I cannot know the outcome of what will have transpired from the second week of October until now, the start of November. What I do know is that today, as I write, it is six days since Hamas, may their name be erased, brutally attacked our People in Israel. What I know today is that now and forever Jews will remember that October 7th, the seventh day of Sukkot, the last day of the holiday in Israel, was a day that became part of our sad history. This year Simchat Torah was not a day of joy; it became the bloodiest day in Jewish history since the Shoah.

On that first day of the war every shul had to decide how they would balance the command to be joyous on the holiday of Simchat Torah with the start of a terrorist attack on the Jewish State. We heard stories of Jews dancing on Simchat Torah in bomb shelters in Israel, and other rabbis in Israel telling fellow Jews to go home to the shelters and to take care of loved ones.

This year I had a meal on Sukkot in a Sukka with several colleagues. One of our elders was there and we were privileged to hear stories about his survival in the camps during the Holocaust. We learned that as a young child he had helped to lead the Hallel, Psalms of Praise, on a holiday in the camp. He remarked how meaningful it was for them to have the remembrance of joy at such a hard time. I thought about this story when we decided to go forward with our Simchat Torah celebration, albeit in a more muted way. All shuls outside of Israel needed to adapt to the terrible emerging reality of the day. Some cancelled evening services, believing there was no way to dance at this time of war. Others, like ours, adapted our services to try to hold both some

joy for Torah while honoring the horror and shock we all felt.

Each year as I prepare for our Yom Kippur musaf service I consider which parts of the martyrology section we will present and focus on that year. We begin with a remembrance of the rabbinic martyrs murdered by Rome. We often speak about the Crusades, the pogroms, the Holocaust, and a more modern act of anti-Semitism. This coming year we will remember those who were martyred on Simhat Torah. "Eleh Ezkerah, these I recall and my soul melts with sorrow, for the bitter course of our history I recall" those who were murdered on Simchat Torah in the south of Israel in their homes, at a music festival, helping others, and in defense of their fellow citizens. Eleh Ezkera, these we will remember.

We do not yet know how Israel will be changed by this horrible war. In the coming weeks and months, we will move into a new reality. Hopefully peace and security will be restored.

In the time of the Maccabees, we were not able to celebrate Sukkot in the great Temple in Jerusalem. After the Temple was rededicated on Hanukkah, our people brought the sacrifices from the 8 days of Sukkot to the Temple. Our next Jewish holiday is Hanukkah, and we know that many Israeli and Jewish families will be missing loved ones this year and forever. We continue to wish all the bereaved condolences and we pray for healing for all who were injured and for The Jewish People. May our People know no more sorrow.

The effects still remain, although life has resumed becoming "normal" for most of us. It's a "new" normal. I am sure the same will happen to the folks living in and supporting Israel from around the world.

No doubt this is hard for us all. Israel will recover. Yes, it may be a changed Israel. But Israel will go on. And so must we.

TJC: How did you decide to join TJC?



Becoming more connected within TJC, meeting more people and participating in more community events.






The Jewish calendar, the liturgy, or the parshah will provide the focus for our practice. You will leave relaxed, refreshed, and centered as you enter the next week.



This month's song comes from **Riva Levy**, who grew up on Kibbutz-Ein-Dor. Having taught at TJC for many years, Riva, Howie, and their adult children travel often to Israel. She tells us: "I chose this song (https://bit.ly/video-wheat-still-grows) to honor the 50th anniversary of the Yom Kippur War. My brother fought in Sinai. Our kibbutz lost four soldiers including, Amotz, my brother's best friend, and Hanan, my friend's brother. The song brings hope that life must continue despite devastating losses."

The Wheat Still Grows Again

(Lyrics: Dorit Tzameret; Music: Haim Barkani, Translation: Elli Sacks)

The fields spill out below, as far as the earth meets sky, Beneath the olive trees and Mount Gilboa. At eve, the valley's splendor hits your eye, The likes of which you've never seen before. It's not the same old house now, it's not the same old valley, You're gone and never can return again. The path, the boulevard, a skyward eagle tarries...And yet the wheat still grows again. And everything that was, perhaps will ever be, The rising and the setting of the sun...And songs are always sung, but can they speak. The vastness of the loss and all the love. It is the same old house now, yes it's the same old valley, But you — they never can return again. And can it be, how can it be, how through Time's endless tally...Somehow the wheat still grows again. And from the bitter earth, new neighborhoods will bloom, A boy upon the grass, next to his puppy lies. The nights descend upon a well-lit room, on those within, and thoughts locked up inside. It's not the same old house now, it's not the same old valley, You're gone and never can return again; the path, the boulevard, a skyward eagle tarries...And yet the wheat still grows...



This month's recipe comes from **Anne Dechter**, who shares:

"This is our family's favorite hummus recipe, (slightly) adapted from <u>Michael Solomonov's</u>. It's the closest we've gotten to Israeli hummus, best eaten right away, preferably while still warm from the food processor." Anne and Gadi (born in Israel), moved to Princeton in 2022. With their children, Teddy and Hannah, they go to Israel yearly, and often visit Shlomo ve Doron, a hummuseria in Tel Aviv.

Hummus Tehina

<u>Ingredients</u>: 4 garlic cloves, unpeeled; 1/2c. (or more) fresh lemon juice; 1 3/4 tsp kosher salt; 1c. tahini (Soom is a great brand)1/2 tsp ground cumin; 3c. canned chickpeas, rinsed w/warm water and drained; Olive oil and za'atar for serving.

<u>Directions</u>: Blend garlic, lemon juice, and 1 tsp salt in a food processor. Let the mixture sit for 10 minutes, and then strain the liquid out into a bowl. Throw away the solids. Pour liquid back into the food processor. Add tahini, cumin, and the remaining 3/4 tsp salt, and pulse to combine. While the processor is still running, add up to 1/2 cup ice water, a tablespoon at a time, blending until mixture is super smooth and silky. Add chickpeas, and blend and blend and blend (2+ minutes, more than you think you should!) until smooth, thick, and fluffy. Add more salt, lemon juice, and cumin to taste. To serve, spread the hummus in a bowl, drizzle with good olive oil, and sprinkle with lots of za atar.
