THIRD MEETING OF THE SOCIAL ACTION COMMITTEE 2023-2024

REPORTS

Members of the Committee met via Zoom to discuss the continued work of the Social Action Committee with ongoing projects, and to hear of requests for new initiatives. Members discussed how to have engage wider TLC participation and to figure out how to better inform the congregation about the work. Members of TJC are deeply involved in all aspects of social action and community service in Princeton and surrounding communities. Discussion was had as to how the Committee can continue its mission by looking at ways to:

- 1. Look at the TJC calendar and "organize" drives and initiatives clearly.
- 2. Better inform the congregation about opportunities to volunteer through creative use of media available.
- 3. Present a clear statement of the congregants' work and the TJC's commitments to Social Action writ large.

Not in Our Town Princeton

Having continuous conversations about race, diversity, equity and inclusion. As a rule, except for November 2023, meetings are held the first Monday of each month in the Princeton Public Library.

The current issue being studied and worked on is called, **Truth and Transformation**, where with the Princeton Human Rights Commission, along with Faith based organizations and the Princeton Public Library are looking at the issue of reparations for African Americans to address longitudinal effects of racial discrimination. Mention was made of New Jersey's passage of a bill calling for a taskforce to study reparations.

There is an effort to show the movie, "Cost of Inheritance" later this spring or next Fall. There will also be three sessions in the truth and Transformation programing; one on slavery, one on the local faith institutions and one addressing Morven's history.

Linda mentioned a Princeton Police incident with a Redding Circle resident's granddaughter, who upon trying to visit her grandmother was stopped and handcuffed and ticketed. That individual is in need of legal representation. NIOT will be seeking a meeting with the police.

An item not discussed this month but may be coming up is: Racial and Social Justice Work Awards each year. The event that usually takes place in June.

Volunteer at our Trenton Pantry

*Located at 48 Hudson Street, Trenton NJ Monday- Wednesday from 9AM to 12PM *It is street parking-volunteers are advised to park on Tyler Street. Pantry Volunteers may be responsible for:

- Intake Support: Recording (pen and paper) basic information (name, address, # of people in household) from community members prior to them receiving their groceries
- Bagging: Traditional bagging/ replenishing of non-perishable groceries, fresh produce and frozen meats

~Pantry Volunteers should dress comfortably & appropriate for weather conditions as we have our garage door open when serving clients. Sneakers and closed toed shoes are preferred for safety.

Send Hunger Packing West Windsor-Plainsboro

The Send Hunger Packing West Windsor-Plainsboro <u>www.shupwwp.org</u> Provides six weekend meals to students in the West Windsor-Plainsboro schools in grades K-6 who are eligible for free and reduced lunches. The program hosts two Little Free Pantries, one at the WW Arts Council and the other at the Dutch Neck Presbyterian Church. To supplement, a few times during the year, grocery store cards are distributed.

SHUPWW-P had a robust food collection at the MLK Day of Service held at the West Windsor Senior Center.

The program, part of Mercer Street Friends, was also asked to help provide Family Food Bags to the families in the upper grades who are NOT part of the weekend food program. And continue to distribute grocery store cards at two times (or more as funds are available) during the school year.

In discussion of how to make the Imperatives accessible, after much discussion, there was consensus that each individual or team would create a 1-3 minute "tick tock" type video about the area in which they are engaged and send that to Michelle A.

The hope would be to have material that could be put on the Lobby monitor at TJC, used in teaching and support the work of the "Imperative of Social Justice." The timing and rollout of the educational piece is something the Committee would like to bring to the Board.
