TAKING HOLD OF TORAH

Shavuot is the second of the three pilgrimage holidays given in the Torah. Each festival corresponds to an ancient harvest time, and to an event in the religious history of the Jewish people. Shavuot, fifty days from the 2nd night of Passover, celebrates the start of the wheat/grain harvest in the Land of Israel. It is our holiday of First Fruits, where we celebrate the produce of the land. Shavuot connects us to the cycles of the earth's year in a universal way, reminding all of our dependence on land, rain at the appropriate times, sun, and the entire agricultural system. The holiday connects us to the specific land of Israel, as it, and all of the Pilgrimage festivals, follow the calendar of Israel, our ancient and modern homeland, thus tying our people to the Land.

Shavuot is also important in our liturgical or religious calendar, called z'man matan Torateinu, our time of receiving of Torah. On Shavuot we celebrate receiving Torah by imagining that each one of us, our souls, actually stood at Mount Sinai and either perceived, felt or heard God's Presence. Of course, we cannot really know what occurred at Mount Sinai at the time of the Giving of Torah. Some believe that we received only the Ten Commandments; others say the entire written and oral Torahs. Some say that all that we received at Mount Sinai was Revelation itself - God revealing God's Presence to each of us, and all of the written words came later throughout the generations. Each of these approaches to what occurred at Mount Sinai have been discussed by our great thinkers; each way of approaching what occurred at Sinai can bring holiness into our lives.

What each approach has in common is the notion that the entire Jewish People stood at Mount Sinai together, anticipating God's Presence and living in the aftermath of the experience of sensing God. What could it look and feel like if we rededicated ourselves to being together as a community to celebrate the receiving of Torah as a community? Even if you do not usually see yourself as someone who joins in at TJC for this kind of program, we invite you to come and to be part of celebrating Jewish identity by coming to all or any part of the holiday festivities. This year we open our Shavuot programming with something for every age and stage, and we hope that you will join us and bring friends. In a year where there has been an increase in moments of anti-Semitism and unrest for our people, please come together for the opposite: a meaningful and fun celebration of Torah and community.

Join us on Tuesday, June 11 for an evening of Receiving Torah. We begin with a program for ages 5 and under and their families. Later, young and older, are all invited to make cheesecake together. It is a time for intergenerational connection in our TJC community. We will join together for dinner, davening, singing and three learning sessions. Our featured speaker is our own Dr. Ra'anan Boustan, scholar in the program of Judaic Studies at Princeton. In addition, our teens will teach their Torah of advocacy. All of us will have the opportunity to engage in traditional *hevruta* (paired) study, where everyone in the community can learn and share their insights on our sacred text. Come and be part of our collective receiving of Torah. And/or, join us for services on Wednesday and Thursday (Yizkor memorial prayers are said on Thursday) mornings as we celebrate our connections to Land, the Land of Israel and the endeavor of Torah study. And if the prayer part of the day is not your "thing," feel free to come to our lobby, enjoy some coffee and conversation and be on TJC's campus during the holiday! MESSAGE from the President

It's hard for me to believe a year has passed since I had the pleasure of becoming President of The Jewish Center. This experience has been a gift to me. I know we have dealt with happy times and most difficult times and continue to do so together. We have fortunately had many successes - some bigger than others.

A year ago, I stood on the bima and said I hoped to raise \$750,000 this year in honor of The Jewish Center's 75th anniversary. Most didn't think this was achievable. I knew I was setting the bar high, but I was optimistic we could reach this goal. We almost got there. We raised \$650,000 - more than we had ever raised in a single year before! Let's set our sights on raising \$750,000 this coming year - we're so close. Wouldn't it be great if we could do this?

In addition, The Jewish Center also raised more than \$600,000 for the newly started Israel Impact Fund as an immediate response to October 7th. The fund is now key to helping Kibbutz Holit rebuild.

We successfully planted daffodils in Tiger Park in Palmer Square in the fall. This past March, we held a ceremony in the new daffodil garden and unveiled the stone and plaque that is dedicated to the memory of the 1.5 million children who perished in the Holocaust. This is the first and only Holocaust memorial in Princeton.

We all came together to share our 75-year history as we sailed the Chai Seas into the next 75 years. It was a beautiful evening of friendship, memories, and fun. We celebrated our honorees and each other in recognition of our incredible journey.

While we have much to be thankful for, there is still so much work to be done...at The Jewish

Center, our schools, our university campuses, and the world.

Every one of us should volunteer. Give an hour a month, more if you can. It's so important. We would love to have you on a Jewish Center committee. Let me know what interests you, and we'll make a connection. Check out the article on page 41 that lists potential volunteer opportunities.

When David and I first joined The Jewish Center, Helaine Isaacs asked me to be on a committee. One thing led to the next - I became the chair of the committee and a board VP, and after taking a year or two off, I became president. You never know what volunteering can lead to! I never thought this was a position I would have or want. But as I said earlier, it has been a gift.

Please challenge yourself. Share your skills with us. Share your time with us. Make new friends. Engage in your community. You never know what you will get out of the experience. Please see page 41 for our volunteer information.

As of this writing, we are coming to the end of the school year. Like every other year, this was a year of tremendous learning, growth and new experiences. We kicked off the school year together with a school-wide Rosh Hashanah program, where the students learned about the different symbols of Rosh Hashanah. We took advantage of the holidays landing on Sundays by celebrating Sukkot and Simchat Torah together as a community of learners. We learned together as our older students solved the Chanukanundrum while our younger learners laughed and created Chanukah jokes. We celebrated the trees with a Tu Bishvat seder for our older students, and enjoyed learning about Purim through another escape room program! For Passover, we had a school-wide selfie seder, and we are looking forward to gathering at "Sinai" for Shavuot!

Our learners participated in four Shabbat programs in which they actively participated in leading Shabbat morning services, attended Shabbat dinners, and had grade-level Shabbat lunches.

And that was just for grades pre-K - 7!

Our 9th and 10th graders went to Washington, DC to lobby and advocate in Senator Booker's and Congresswoman Watson-Coleman's offices, in which they shared their thoughts on mental health and antisemitism, respectively. Our 8-12th graders participated in intergenerational programming where they baked together, ate together, played games together, and learned together as part of the Better Together program through the Legacy Heritage Foundation.

Our teens took advantage of our new Moadon (teen lounge) for social activities and learning. They watched movies, professional sports games, played ping pong, and hung out with friends. They also had a great year assisting in the religious school classrooms and working with the younger students. They took their jobs as madrichim quite literally - they served as role models and enjoyed guiding their learners in their growth!

Our young families also enjoyed numerous activities as well! Besides our monthly Shabbat Katan program, our

youngest learners explored the synagogue, built edible sukkahs, had a pajama havdalah service, and so much more! We also started the TJC Tot Spot in the school building where parents and tots can come together!

I can't believe all of this happened in under 30 weeks! Next year promises to be even more exciting! We will continue our learning, breakfasts and Shabbatot together. We will have trips to the Turtleback Zoo, the Brooklyn Jewish Children's Museum, New York, Philadelphia and Washington D.C.! LIFE & LEGACY

Each person who makes a Promise, a Promise of a legacy gift, has his or her own reason. For me, the reason is my father. Born in Berlin, before the rise of the Nazis, my father, Ernst Joseph, grew up in a lewish home that was intertwined with German culture. He survived the Holocaust by living in hiding. In a small apartment in the center of Berlin, Leni and Paul Pissarius, a gentile couple, hid my father and grandmother for 27 months. When the war ended, my father walked out to the street only to encounter a soldier, a Russian. The soldier aimed his rifle at a young, thin man with straight blond hair and bright blues, a man who resembled so many Nazis. My father shouted, "Jude, Jude! Ich bin Jude!" The rifle stayed focused, and the soldier demanded, "Recite the Shema." My father guickly shouted, "Shema Yisrael Adonai eloheinu Adonai echad."

With a stroke of luck, or perhaps divine intervention, the soldier put down his rifle, walked up to my father and embraced him, saying that he too was a Jew. The world had turned upside down.

Sadly, the world is again turning. My parents have passed away, and indeed, the number of Holocaust survivors is rapidly shrinking. It is painful to witness the rise in antisemitism erupting throughout the US, a return to hate-filled speech and violence that our parents and grandparents experienced in Europe.

A strong synagogue is a powerful weapon against antisemitism. Here in Princeton, The Jewish Center is our Jewish home, a place of prayer, learning, and a symbol of Judaism. We just recently celebrated our 75th anniversary, and with your support, we will continue to provide a vibrant Jewish life to the community for the next 75 years.

Make Your Promise!

LIFE & LEGACY Shabbat

D'var torah for Vayakhel and Shekalim – March 9, 2024 Phil Carchman

We join a synagogue for different reasons. Perhaps given our varied backgrounds, we join because we simply want a place to pray as Jews; possibly, we are a young married couple looking for social interactions with other young Jewish couples; maybe we have children, and we look for a place to provide a Jewish education; or perhaps we come here from a different community and the synagogue provides an important resource for integrating into our new lives. In sum, we join to meet spiritual, social, educational and common issues with people of our faith. And everyone who becomes part of this unique community wants to see it survive and prosper.

This Shabbat is unusual - we have a double header as we have a special Shabbat - shekalim, where the maftir describes that when the temple in Jerusalem stood, a census required every Israelite man to contribute a half shekel to support specifically the temple's communal sacrifices. The contribution was egalitarian. "The rich shall not pay more, and the poor shall not pay less than half a shekel." As an aside, I have learned that during temple times, while the primary use of the funds collected was to maintain the sacrifices, a secondary use of funds was to pay the salary of judges – for some reason, that just caught my eye.

This morning, I want to focus on this Shabbat's parsha – Vayakhel, as it provides us with the historical background of the construction of the Tabernacle - the Mishkan. First, Moses instructs the Israelites on the requirements of Shabbat and then discusses the construction of the Mishkan. Moses encourages the

Israelites and says "everyone whose heart so moves him shall bring gifts for the Lord – gold, or silver, wool or linen, wood or oil, spices or stones, anything to make the sanctuary more glorious for God."

For Moses was instructing the Israelites that the construction of a Mishkan would be a community effort. But note the specific limiting condition – the gifts would be given by those whose heart so moves them. The people responded in force. The text tells us that "the whole community of Israelites left Moses' presence to find gifts for the Lord; everyone whose spirit was moved brought offerings. Men and women, moved by their hearts, brought the gifts, and these men and women worked together using their skills to make the sacred sanctuary for god."

Then a strange circumstance occurred. A phenomenon that would make Heidi, Alexandra, and all of us past presidents swoon - the contributions of the Israelites. responding to Moses' appeal, resulted in another exhortation from Moses, who said: "Bring no more gifts for the sanctuary." The gifts had been enough for all the work. There was too much. (A fundraiser's dream.) But the serious message is that the hearts of the Israelites were full and committed to fulfilling the mandate. The tabernacle was built, and the parsha describes in exquisite detail how it was built; what it looked like; the artisans who worked on it - all to fulfill the needs of the community.

As I said earlier, we come together here at TJC for different reasons. We come together

to meet our spiritual, educational, social or personal needs and then over time, our focus changes where we must think less about our needs and more about the future of the institution that has been so much a part of our lives. We come to recognize that sustaining the health and heart of our congregation is critical to our being. How do we do this?

Over 12 years ago, one of our congregants, Florence Kahn, who was then president of the Jewish Community Foundation and the Foundation's executive director, Julie Davison Meyers, successfully secured a grant from the Grinspoon Foundation for seed money to establish a Life and Legacy program in the Princeton area. Two then-board members, Jerry Neumann and Gil Gordon, were integral players in the process, and the Princeton area was one of nine communities throughout the country to receive the funding. A historic note - included in the grant application was a letter written some years before by a local resident and part of the Princeton Jewish community, seeking funding from the Princeton University for support for WWI Jewish refugees. The author, speaking from his heart, was Albert Einstein.

After securing the grant, The Jewish Center board established our own Life and Legacy program, which has been led by two of our congregants who are here today - Evy Grossman and a former TJC President, Eliot Freeman. What motivates those participating in the Life and Legacy program is the modern fulfillment of Moses' admonition - to act from the heart and make certain that as we celebrate our 75th year, this congregation has the financial wherewithal to survive. To be clear, unlike the Israelites in Vayakhel, who came with hearts and hands full with their contributions, or even the mandated ½ shekel in Shekalim, the Life and Legacy program does not ask for a contribution. There is no need to bring gold, silver, wool or even cash. All that is necessary is a promise; a commitment to make an endowment gift at some future time. Some choose to fulfill the promise through their wills, while others make current gifts during their lifetime to the endowment fund to ensure that there will be resources to sustain The Jewish Center.

Vayakhel instructs us that the gifts must be made from the heart. It is the heart that brought us to this place in the first instance. It is the heart that educated our children; it is the heart that met our spiritual needs; it is the heart that gave us fellowship among friends; it is the heart that assisted us in times of grief or in times of want.

Rabbi James Jacobson-Maisels sums it up this way: "like the Israelites in the wilderness, we too can offer our sacrifices, our money, and our generosity to enable others to dwell within us and to give the others, like the divine, a secure dwelling-place on earth."

Vayakhel instructs us that our heart must govern. Vayakhel leads us to understand that our hearts will inspire a promise for future generations that will follow and sustain our TIC.

Shabbat shalom.
