Save the Date – March 21-23, 2025, Jewish Wisdom During Difficult Times

Since 1997, I have had the privilege of attending the Rabbinical Assembly Convention, where I am continually inspired by my beloved colleagues. One of the highlights for me each year has been the opportunity to learn from Rabbi Dr. Bradley Shavit Artson. Rabbi Artson's teaching is nothing short of transformative—his ability to integrate theology, philosophy, ethics, and Bible with contemporary issues and spirituality is unparalleled. Over the years, I have eagerly sought out his classes, often arriving early to secure a seat, and more than once, I have found myself sitting on the floor to absorb his wisdom. You now will have the same opportunity to learn with Rabbi Dr. Bradley Shavit Artson when he joins us at The Jewish Center for a special weekend on March 21-23.

Although I did not encounter Rabbi Artson until after rabbinical school, I've been fortunate to be his student since my first year in the rabbinate. His Torah resonates deeply with rabbis and the broader Jewish community, and I know you will find his teachings profound and inspiring.

We are thrilled to welcome Rabbi Artson to The Jewish Center for a special weekend of learning and reflection from March 21-23, 2025. Rabbi Artson is the Dean of the Ziegler School of Rabbinic Studies and Vice President of American Jewish University in Los Angeles. He is also the Dean of the Zacharias Frankel College in Potsdam, Germany, where they ordain Conservative rabbis for Europe. An accomplished author, Rabbi Artson has written twelve books on topics ranging from theology and philosophy to Torah study and inclusion. His Torah is at once accessible and erudite, making him a master teacher for both rabbis and lay people alike.

Here is a glimpse of the weekend:

- Friday, March 21: 6:00 pm Service, followed by dinner and learning with Rabbi Artson on the topic, "Embracing the God We Actually Love: Process Theology and Judaism"
- Saturday, March 22: Dvar Torah during morning services, followed by a Lunch & Learn on Kol Adat B'nai Yisrael The Whole People of Israel: Lessons on Inclusion from the Torah and My Son.
- Sunday, March 23: Morning session on Alexander the Great Life Lessons from African Women Warriors – all in the Talmud!

I encourage you to join us for this special opportunity to engage with one of the leading Jewish thinkers of our time. It promises to be an enriching and transformative weekend, and I hope you'll plan to spend it with us at The Jewish Center.

Shalom!

Back in 1920, a man named Earle Dickson and his wife Josephine lived in Highland Park, New Jersey. Like many of us still do today, Josephine often cut and burned her hands while cooking. Earle, an employee of Johnson and Johnson, wanted to find a way to help, so he created something that allowed her to dress her wounds by herself. He then shared his idea with his employer, and thus, the Band-Aid was born!

We have Band-Aids in many shapes, sizes, and even colors and designs, and they all serve the same purpose - to help heal a wound. Back in the fall, I invited our fifth, sixth, and seventh graders to join me in the social hall. As they walked in, I handed each of them a Band-Aid, and we discussed what the Band-Aid represented. Some said healing, others said helping, but they all understood that when given a Band-Aid, its purpose was to help. I told them that they would have an opportunity to help heal the world with their Band-Aids.

As a group, we learned about different organizations. Some were local, some were based in the United States, and some were based in Israel. The students walked around the room and placed Band-Aids on sheets of paper with the name of the organization they wanted to learn more about. They researched their organizations, learned about their history, saw how their donations were spent, and then created posters to teach our community about their cause. On December 15 at 11:00 a.m., our religious school students in grades Pre-K through 4 (Gan Katan through Daled) as well as many of you, came into the Social Hall for our Tikkun Olam (Repairing the World) Festival. Together as a community, we learned about how JFCS and Mazon address food insecurity. We learned about the Trenton Area Soup Kitchen and Homefront and all the help they provide to our community. We learned about the

Hero's Circle and Zichron Menachem and how they help kids with cancer. We learned about the First Responder efforts of ZAKA and the American Friends of Magen David Adom. We supported our Jewish War Veterans and helped the visually impaired in Israel while learning about the Israel Guide Dog Center, and we learned about how the JSPCA helps the stray animals living in Jerusalem.

We sold Band-Aids for 1 dollar each. These Band-Aids gave each person who purchased an opportunity to "heal" (or donate) to one of the above organizations. Imagine everyone's collective surprise and joy to learn that we ran out of Band-Aids! We raised \$510 for these organizations, and our religious school students were so proud of their hard work. They not only learned the importance of helping, but they also learned that they can make a difference in the world.

I am so proud of each of them!






Shabbat Meditation


February 18 *Moonflower Murders* by Anthony Horowitz





- Download the Listen EVERYWHERE app from Listen Technologies Corporation. It's available on both the Apple App Store and Android/Google Play stores.
- After you've downloaded the app, you'll have an icon on your phone that looks like this:




- Click it and it will open the app. The app will perform a quick venue scan to find the available audio channels (you need to do this at TJC when the PA system is turned on).
- The app will display a Welcome screen and may play a Welcome video. You can skip this by tapping the 'Skip Ad' button at the top right of the screen.
- It will then show the audio channel. Tap the channel and the sound should come through the app.
- From there, however you integrate audio with your hearing aid, you should be able to adjust volume and choose your preferred equalization curve via your hearing aid app.



Gary Bass, the William P. Boswell Professor of World Politics of Peace and War at Princeton University, is the author of *Judgment at Tokyo: World War II on Trial* and the *Making of Modern Asia* (Knopf); *The Blood Telegram: Nixon, Kissinger, and a Forgotten Genocide* (Knopf); *Freedom's Battle: The Origins of Humanitarian Intervention* (Knopf); and *Stay the Hand of Vengeance: The Politics of War Crimes Tribunals* (Princeton University Press).

Judgment at Tokyo won the Arthur Ross Book Award from the Council on Foreign Relations, was the finalist for the Mark Lynton History Prize, a finalist for the Cundill History Prize, and longlisted for the Baillie Gifford Prize. It was named one of the year's 10 best books by The Washington Post, one of the 12 essential nonfiction books by The New Yorker, one of the 100 notable books by The New York Times, one of the 10 essential books by The Telegraph, and a New York Times Book Review editors' choice, as well as a best book of the year by The Economist, Foreign Affairs, The Times Literary Supplement, Prospect, and Air Mail.

The Blood Telegram was a Pulitzer Prize finalist in general nonfiction and won the Arthur Ross Book Award from the Council on Foreign Relations, the Bernard Schwartz Book Award from the Asia Society, the Cundill History Prize, and the Lionel Gelber Prize, among other awards.

A former reporter for *The Economist*, he has written for *The New York Times, The New Yorker, The Washington Post, The Atlantic, Foreign Affairs*, and other publications.







Recap Cheses of a second

TJC celebrated a Day of Chesed in conjunction with Martin Luther King weekend and it was a great day! The were many varied activities and a wonderful atmosphere. Over 120 people participated in acts of loving kindness and had the opportunity to strengthen their connection to other congregants and to TJC and to the community.

Some highlights:

The art project where parents and children made beautiful collage banners to adorn senior living spaces. Come see the beautiful creative collages which will be displayed in the lobby for viewing prior to delivery to their ultimate homes!

The library project helped us to relocate our children's library to the school building. This activity benefitted from participation of strong, tall adults who could reach the upper shelves and manage large boxes of books as well as children who sometimes carried just a book or two to the other building.

About 35 soupmakers of all ages cut, chopped and cooked vegetables which allowed us to deliver 40 quarts of soup to the Trenton Area Soup Kitchen. Participation was brisk and a quick run to the supermarket to replenish supplies was needed for the second shift.

Project Linus blankets were made while attendees chatted and made knots to complete 10 cute and cuddly blankets for hospitalized children.

Interfaith stitchers had their monthly meeting at TJC where ranks from our congregation swelled significantly beyond previous meetings.

The blood drive we hosted drew congregants and others from the community which resulted in the collection of 39 pints of blood and will help over 100 patients.

Off-site TJC congregants helped with sorting of groceries at JFCS.

Several of our talented musicians gathered and jammed to the entertainment of others in the Java Nagila café.

And of course there were bagels at the kick off and pizza at the close.

The organizational efforts and involvement of so many from TJC made it this successful, rewarding and enjoyable day. We are looking forward to even more activities and involvement next year. You won't want to





- Allowing us to celebrate more *simchot* together


