### The Challenge of Passover

Some believe that Passover is our holiday with the most strictures, and the most varied traditions of all our festivals. It is certainly true that the physical preparation for keeping kosher during Passover can be time consuming and expensive. On the other hand, Passover preparations make our holiday more meaningful. Taking care to clean out leavened products encourages us to rid ourselves of the metaphorical leaven in our lives; this can be a time to think about our own character traits, including being boastful or arrogant. The Exodus story reminds us that it was God that took us out of bondage, in partnership with Moses.

Another great challenge in Passover comes during the Seder itself. During the *maggid* section we read or sing, "In every generation one is obligated to see oneself as one who personally went out from Egypt. As it says in the Torah in Exodus 13:8, 'You shall tell your child that very day: It's because of this that God did for me when I went out from Egypt." In addition to being a place and nation, the word "Egypt" literally denotes a place that is narrow. In each generation and at each seder we are meant to feel empathy for our ancestors who were enslaved and who went through the process of becoming free. We are also asked to think about what narrow places we are in our own lives so that we can envision a path out of narrowness; or into what the psalmist calls, "a great expanse," a place that is open with possibilities. Doing this spiritual work is demanding.

I find however that the most difficult part of observing Passover might be crafting a seder that accommodates and speaks to the diverse observances, views, attention span and ways of learning from our participants. I hope that we are all well beyond a time when the most asked question at a seder is, "when can we eat?" Seder can be educational, meaningful, fun, intellectual and filled with good food, family and friends. I invite you to spend time planning your seder in a deliberate way. Below are some of my quick tips for planning a meaningful seder:

- Know your crowd. Plan goals for content and time. Plan. Every good class has a lesson plan; the seder is a class and needs to be planned. Have enough of the same Haggadot for everyone at the table and have other Haggadot available to explore.

Make sure you have good translations and transliteration for parts where you want participation. Buy good Haggadot, or create your own Haggadah: https://www.haggadot.com/

- Find a way to remember those who are no longer living. A picture, story or recipe.
- Start eating at Karpas! When I was a kid we dipped parsley into salt water, said the blessing, ate a salty bite and moved on. Not anymore. We do this and then we literally serve dips—all kinds of Israeli *slatim*/dips/salad. My favorite is boiled artichokes with dipping sauces a sure sign of spring. Just no matza yet! (you can use Kosher for Passover tam tams)
- Remember that *Maggid* (the story of The Exodus) is the key part of the seder.

- Let participants know about how long the seder will be, when the meal will arrive and approximate end time.
- Assign parts beforehand. Make sure there are appropriate parts for kids and elders.
- Invite guests to dress comfortably.
- If you can afford to do so, have help. Delegate kitchen jobs so it is not the same people.
- Invite a non-family member. It changes the dynamic, for the better.
- Have comfortable seating. Recline. Use the living room/den for the seder before the meal.
- Make this joyful, musical, intellectual, and meaningful. Not everyone wants to read—give those who do not another task. Remember that you may have people with differing opinions at your seder—be calm.
- Place cards are helpful. Do not sit "talkers" near each other.
- Move around during the seder. Get up and stretch.
- Make Seder joyful, musical, intellectual, and meaningful. Not everyone wants to read—and, Have a good time!

## MESSAGE from the President

Two years ago I recall meeting with a friend and fellow congregant to discuss what it meant to be president of The Jewish Center. What I want to accomplish? What were my key goals? What did I wanted to leave as my legacy? I remember responding - I don't know, I don't know, I don't know. It was scary to be assuming this responsibility and not really having a true direction.

In for a dime, in for a dollar. The board and I started working really hard at figuring out our future.

We started by addressing the face of The Jewish Center. We neatened up the landscaping, repaired and added lighting, cleaned up the parking lot and painted fresh lines, added security features and planted mums for the high holidays that looked nice throughout the winter.

Then we moved inside. We spruced up the Teen Lounge with fresh paint (and a large Star of David and stripes) and added games our teens love. In the lobby, we added new seating areas, creating a place for the Shabbat Lobby Minyon. We moved the Tree of Life plaques to be on full display in the lobby, and we created a coat room where there was none. The number of repairs we made within the building are too numerous to mention. The Library has been cleaned out and organized. It's now a very functional space. We have even established an arts and crafts room for everyone to use!

One of our biggest accomplishments has been the creation of the Java Nagilah Cafe. We created a wonderful open space in an unused foyer. Now it is a popular gathering place for folks to meet for coffee, fun, relaxation or a meeting. Come visit!

We created opportunities to partner with members of the larger community for rental income. We rented our grassy lot to a nonprofit that sold Christmas trees to the community and rented our meat kitchen to Princeton University's Center for Jewish Life. We even rent out space in the Social Hall to a Bridge Club!

The Daffodil project was a partnership with Palmer Square. We planted daffodils in memory of the children that perished in the Holocaust. The following spring we installed and had an unveiling of a stone placed in Palmer Square to keep the memory of these children alive and in celebration of our 75th anniversary.

We created a team to develop plans to celebrate our 75th anniversary. The celebration broke all Jewish Center records - for attendance and for the amount of money raised! It was a fabulous evening!

We traveled as a community to the south to learn about our history.

We added musicians to our Friday night services and expanded our Shabbat dinner programs.

There is SO much more - so many wonderful accomplishments we have done these last two years. I am so proud of and grateful for everything we have accomplished.

So whether we have improved the outside of our building, the inside of the building, our relationships with each other or the larger community, we have made so much progress.

But what I am most proud of, is the fact that The Jewish Center has become a NICER place to be. We are KINDER to each other. We ARE a warm and welcoming community. We have welcomed an extraordinary 39 new families into our fold just this year alone! We have introduced "welcome bags" for new members, welcome phone calls, TJC buddies, and have really made an effort to make all people feel welcome here. We have invited people to a new member brunch and Havdalah. I'm hopeful this trend is here to stay.



### Shalom!

I'm often told, "Words have meaning." The words we use can vastly impact someone's life. Words are so powerful that Judaism has halachot or laws about the power of our words. Leviticus 19:16 teaches us not to speak slander or be a talebearer. I bring this up because words can (and should!) be used for good. From February 28 to March 3, I took our teens to Washington, D.C. to learn how to use their words for good. We participated in a program called L'Taken, run by the Religious Action Center for Reform Judaism (RAC), and we gathered with 400 teens from around the United States. Over the four days we were there, we sang an anthem written by Elana Arian, called I Have A Voice. They sang choruses of "I have a voice / my voice is powerful / my voice can change the world," and indeed, it has.

They used their voices to learn that weekend. They learned about how government works and how money and power often influence decision-making. They were reminded about how bills become laws. They chose two topics to explore on a deeper level so they could become better advocates. These topics included equal pay, antisemitism, climate change, mental health, disability inclusion, women's reproductive rights, economic justice, gun violence prevention, immigration, voting rights, gender identity and orientation, Israel, and antisemitism. The students were given Jewish texts on a "Living" Talmud," where they could relate the topic they were studying to the Jewish values we uphold. They participated in activities that helped them understand the issues better. They discussed this with their peers from TJC and other synagogues. They took the information they learned and used it to write speeches. Their weekend culminated on Monday, March 3; these students went and met with senators and members of Congress and lobbied on behalf of the RAC.

The students shared excerpts of their speeches at Shabbat services on March 8, where they talked about women's reproductive rights, disability inclusion, antisemitism, and mental health. Beyond the content of their presentations, both in Washington and here, I was most impressed with the way these young people handled themselves. They were kind to each other, respectful, thoughtful and considerate. We should all be proud of the way they represented TJC. They all came off the bus on Monday night, ready to go back next year.

If this is our future, we are in great hands.





# Sale of Chametz


**Sale of** *Chametz*: In preparing for Passover, it is customary to sell your *chametz* (products leaven - made from wheat, spelt, barley, oats, rye, & their derivatives). Jewish law prohibits Jews from using or even possessing any *chametz* during *Pesach*. To ensure compliance with this law, we clean our homes and, just to make sure, we transfer title on any remaining *chametz* to a non-Jew. This *chametz* becomes the property of the non-Jew for the duration of *Pesach* and should be set aside in a place where it will not be disturbed or seen during the holiday. This sale can include the sale of your pet and their *chametz* pet food. The rabbi will serve as your agent for this transaction. If you would like to sell your *chametz*, please complete the form below and return it to the Synagogue no later than **April 8, 2025.**



## New Lobby Exhibit: "Words, Music, Memory" Exhibit Dates: March 25 - April 30

TJC will host a traveling exhibit from the Kennesaw State University Museum of History and Holocaust Education, curated by Adina Langer, Senior Curator in the department of Museums, Archives and Rare Books (and daughter of Mindy and Corey Langer). The exhibit focuses on writings and artwork from people who experienced the Holocaust, some of which have been set to music. As Adina has written,

"This ten-panel traveling exhibit and accompanying digital gallery guide highlights the links along the chain of commemoration that connect the past and the present and generation to generation. While the panels focus on the words of writers who witnessed the Holocaust, the gallery guide includes biographies of the writers, sketches by the panel illustrators, information about musical and dramatic pieces adapted from the writers' works, and interviews with composers, lyricists, performers, and producers. It also provides visitors with opportunities to access performance videos and share their perspectives."

Adina will speak about the process of curating the exhibition and its evolution as it has traveled and been used in various venues, on April 23 following the Yom HaShoah service.

### What about the food?

First, it's not about the food! It's about the warmth and beauty of Shabbat, and while we hope the evening will be special for everyone, gourmet or fancy food is not necessary.

Our goal is to accommodate as many congregants as possible while respecting and honoring those who keep kosher and those who don't keep kosher, and of course, to keep it as simple as possible for everyone. Therefore, whether you keep kosher or not, we are going to ask you to please use certain foods that are kosher.

Specifically, we respectfully request that hosts please do not serve any shellfish or non-kosher meat/chicken/fish. You are welcome to serve a dairy/veggie meal or to purchase kosher meat or chicken and prepare it in your own kosher or non-kosher kitchen. Fish such as salmon is fine to purchase wherever you purchase fish. If you do serve meat or chicken, please do not have any dairy with the meal/dessert.

Purchasing prepared food is also fine and you can find cooked kosher chickens and side dishes at ShopRite in Lawrenceville.

### What if I have special food needs or I'm allergic to some pets?

The Questionnaires that you click on and complete asks about any special food needs you have and pet allergies, and we will do our best to accommodate you.

### Can I bring my kids and my significant other or a friend?

Yes! Please just add them to the Questionnaire you fill out.

### What if I don't get home from work until later on Friday nights/What if I don't want to be out late on a Friday night? What if I don't drive or don't drive at night?


You'll have the opportunity to tell us on the Questionnaires.

### What if I'm not sure how to host or be a guest at a Shabbat dinner?

No problem! We will provide you with a simple brochure with everything you need to know and Rabbi Merow will be offering a class with all the basic information and how-tos. The Committee and Rabbi Merow are available to answer all your questions.

### What support will hosts have?

Each host will receive 2 challahs, a bottle of grape juice, cards with questions and suggestions to stimulate conversation and discussions, and a brochure that has everything you need to know including the blessings (in Hebrew, English and transliteration) for lighting candles, blessing the children, Kiddush, handwashing, and Motzi.

Be part of a shiva minyan Call or visit elderly congregants



Performing these mitzvot benefits not only others but also yourself, for, in the words of Hillel, "If I am not for myself, who will be for me? But if I am only for myself, who am I? If not now, when?"

Researching your Family History...There's No Time Like the Present



As new records are found, scanned, and indexed, more information becomes available in free or paid databases, as well as at local libraries, archives, and historical societies. Her research focuses on Holocaust-era family members. - Download the Listen EVERYWHERE app from Listen Technologies Corporation. It's available on both the Apple App Store and Android/Google Play stores.
- After you've downloaded the app, you'll have an icon on your phone that looks like this:



- Click it and it will open the app. The app will perform a quick venue scan to find the available audio channels (you need to do this at TJC when the PA system is turned on).
- The app will display a Welcome screen and may play a Welcome video. You can skip this by tapping the 'Skip Ad' button at the top right of the screen.
- 6. It will then show the audio channel. Tap the channel and the sound should come through the app.
- 7. From there, however you integrate audio with your hearing aid, you should be able to adjust volume and choose your preferred equalization curve via your hearing aid app.





Bahcall research interests are focused on Observational Cosmology, Dark Matter, Dark Energy, and the Mass Density of the Universe. Bahcall was born in Israel. She received her PhD from Tel Aviv University. She married John N. Bahcall in 1966; they have three children: Safi, Dan, and Orli – all scientists.

### Rogie and Martin Rome

Rogie (a nickname for Rebecca) moved to Princeton from Brooklyn in 1962, and Martin followed in 1963 after leaving the Army. Knowing that greater Trenton had a strong Jewish community at that time, the Romes looked at a number of synagogues before joining TJC. Our vibrant and active Jewish community more than met their expectations. The Romes now live in Windrows, as do other TJC members.

Martin, a retired dentist, recalls the time when TJC was unaffiliated, and its membership included Reform, Conservative, and Orthodox families. Many members worked at RCA in the 1950s.

The Romes knew many of TJC's founding families. At one time, Martin served on the TJC Board. Their oldest child went to Sunday School here.

They no longer attend services regularly in person, but watch on Livestream. Rogie considers TJC as her "second home." Both Martin and Rogie are impressed with our clergy and lay leadership. They have also attended sessions of the 85+ group,

which meets during the week.





She has used mindfulness techniques successfully with her clients for many years, and has drawn on them to create meaningful prayer experiences in TJC's Havurah Minyan.
